What is the program like?

As a student in the LINC Home Study program, you can learn English from the comfort of your home. You have the choice of completing the program either online (using a computer with internet access) or offline (using a traditional textbook and CD). All study materials are based on the Canadian Language Benchmarks standards. To be successful, you have to study hard and commit your time to improving your English skills. This includes studying independently for 5 to 10 hours a week and finishing homework assignments.

Do I get any help?

To ensure you have the best possible learning experience, you receive support from our experienced and qualified staff. You work with a TESL-certified instructor who contacts you every week by phone or VOIP to review your homework, help you

practice speaking and answer your questions. Your instructor develops a learning plan that is tailored to your individual needs and guides you along the path to achieving your goals. You can also contact our technical and program support staff for assistance with any questions you have about the program policies, features or functionality.

How do I register for the program?

To qualify for the program you must have your language skills assessed at a language assessment centre and be:

- of legal school leaving age within your province or territory
- a convention refugee OR a permanent resident of Canada who has not become a Canadian citizen
- unable to attend classroom-based English language training

How much does the program cost?

There is no fee to enrol in this program. LINC Home Study is funded by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada

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

She knows how to handle her students very well and give them encouragement. She keeps posting all the new information we need and is a very punctual person. I am taking this program in the community centre. This community centre is close to where I live. There are a lot of other programs that we can join, too. For instance, beading class, yoga class, healthy food class, and so on.

I would like to brush up my skills in sewing some more. Recently, I just finished learning how to make some modifications of the skirt. Eventually, I will learn how to make different kinds of patterns for basic bodices, and how to cut the fabric. So then I can sew those fabrics into a shirt and make a manipulation from the basic bodice to the princess dart, shoulder dart and waist dart very soon.

My First Garden in Canada

When my husband and I bought a new house in Charlottetown in the spring of 2014, I was so excited because I was going to have a really huge front and back garden. However, I decided not to plant anything the first year, but instead to wait and see what had already been planted. I wasn't that impressed with what I saw, so I decided to plant different flowers in the front and vegetables in the back the following summer. I soon found out that planning a garden is much easier than planting a garden.

Fourth, I dug holes and planted my new flowers and bulbs following the planting instructions in the front yard. Next, I covered them with soil and mulch. In the back yard, I scattered the vegetable seeds on the other bed.

After that, I waited and waited and waited...

At last, all the lilies, dahlias and peonies sprouted young buds. I was so happy. The flowers were in bloom from June until October, except for the peonies, which should bloom next summer or the one after that. I was not successful with the vegetable seeds. None of them sprouted, so I decided that I would start the vegetable seeds indoor first the following spring.

The work wasn't finished yet. A couple days ago, I bought 600 tulip bulbs; they need to be planted before it starts snowing. I put a 150 of them in the ground last Friday. I will plant the others after this rainy weekend.

Although the gardening work is very hard and dirty, I still love it. I bet my front yard will be very beautiful in full bloom next year. Anyway, I will not have to work as hard each year because all of the flowers I planted are perennials. They come back every year. I will just enjoy the nice view without the hard work.

Broadway is the oldest and longest street of New York (25 km). Actually in New York there are four streets with the name Broadway: the streets with the same name are in Brooklyn, Queens and Staten-Island. However, the greatest



fame was gained by Manhattan Broadway. Near the Broadway there is the well-known Theatrical quarter therefore the name of the street became a synonym for the American theatre.

I want to tell you about The Gershwin Theatre, located in the western part of 51st Street in the "Paramount-Plaza" building in theatrical quarter of Manhattan. The auditorium is designed for 1933 persons it is the most capacious theater of the Broadway. In the foyer of theatre there is a Hall of Glory of the American theatre. On June 5, 1983 the 37th awards ceremony of the Tony awards took place. Because of this connection the theatre was renamed the "Gershwin" — for the last name of the brothers Ira (poet-song writer) and George (composer). Why do I want to tell you about this theatre but not any of the others 40 theatres which are in Theatrical Quarter? Because it was my first and, probably brightest, visit to the Broadway.

Since October 30, 2003, and to this day, of one of the most successful American musicals — "Wicked", has been playing at the "Gershwin". "Wicked" is the musical authored by Stephen Schwartz (music and lyrics) and Winnie Holzman (libretto) based on the novel Wicked: The Life and Times of the Wicked Witch of the West by Gregory Maguire. That day when I gathered for this musical, for me, the feeling of a holiday didn't leave me; something magic was just about to happen to me. Even the cloudy weather and sprinkling rain couldn't spoil my mood.

The Broadway was fantastic, noisy and bright. On the Gershwin Theatre there was a big playbill of the musical "Wicked" with a mysterious smile on the green face of the witch. It was a matinee a performance, therefore, there were many children. When I looked at them, I understood that at that moment we were similar in the expectation of a miracle.

The hall was filled quickly; the last call rang out, and the noise of voices in the hall began to calm down and light in the hall began to die away. When a light flashed in a scene, I was struck by the violence of the colours and by the gloss of the scenery and by the music pouring down. The performance was incredibly fascinating,

and the music was fantastic. The narration in The performance on behalf of two witches of the country of Oz: Elphaba- a derelict girl with green skin, future Wicked Witch of the West and Glinda- the attractive and ambitious girl who subsequently became the Kind Witch of the North.

The musical tells the story of the two girls growing, their rivalries in their fight for one beloved is told, and also the fight against the tyranny of the Wizard, by whose efforts the residents of the country Oz were incited against Elphaba. But, no less fascinating action took place and in the auditorium hall. Children were the most active characters of the performance; they loudly showed indignation when Glinda struck Elphaba and roughly rejoiced for the victories of Elphaba over the Wizard. There was a feeling that they were ready to climb on the scene and to help to correct the unfairly created lawlessness. Also, it was incredibly sad when the performance came to an end, not because the feelings about the end of this fine action, but because the residents of the country of Oz didn't understand that the wicked green witch was actually beautiful and kind.

As a consequence, I can say that have been on the Broadway, but I have probably never felt such a fantastic feeling of pleasure, as I did at my the first time, at the musical "Wicked".


Art of Canada

Environmentalists build fish ladders, special waterways that make it possible for salmon passing through dams, when travelling from Sydenham River, where the fish spends its childhood, to Georgian Bay to gain weight and mature. We saw the fish ladders but there was no fish there: it was still too warm for salmon to start migrating. The real show will be at the beginning of October. People say it is a spectacular view.

Harvest Festival



In conclusion, the Canadian and Colombian Education System, works in similar ways of course with some differences and some similarities.

These are the latest numbers, and if we research history, there were several wildfire disasters that caused the loss of hundreds of lives, billions in financial loss, and thousands of displaced residents over the past decades.

We must thank our firefighters! The loss could have been worse if these heroes were not there. They risked their lives and rescued the people and animals. In some incidents, they sacrificed their lives in the rescue mission. These fires are caused for several reasons, including hot weather, heavy lightning and heavy wind. One investigation report stated that 30% of wildfires happen due to human error. For example, discarded cigarettes pieces and irresponsible camping activities can easily cause wildfires. On the other hand, fires can also benefit the ecosystem through natural regeneration. Although we may not be able to prevent wildfires that ignite for natural reasons, human errors that cause fires can certainly be prevented.

While we reflect on the services of firefighters who have made a valiant effort to save our land and people, we should all act responsibly to prevent wildfires and to avoid any further damage to the forests and the wildlife.

In my case, we also ordered a mail forwarding service by Canada Post to prevent missing important mail.

We travelled two days and then arrived at our new home. Before we headed off to our destination, we had checked traffic, road and weather conditions along the way. Fortunately, we had plenty of time to move our household. We took a rest when we felt too tired to drive. Eventually, we succeeded in settling in a new city and new province.

In a word, moving a household from one province to another is difficult work for immigrant families, but we had a memorable experience which was a historic event for my family.


needed it. I thought all the communication I could do by my phone. I did not need to set up such complicated software. I refused to accept my friends' suggestion.

Lessons from the explosion in Tianjin

On August 12, a massive explosion happened at the port of Tianjin in China. The casualties of this accident were 159 dead people, 797 injured, and 14 people, mostly firefighters, missing. It has been the worst one since the founding of the Republic of China in 1949. It was unbelievable that such a large disaster could have happened, but it truly happened. People all over the world felt very sorry at the death of the people in the disaster.

After the accident, Chinese government took quick actions to the accident. It has been almost one month since the accident, and the accident site has almost been cleaned up and the follow-up also has almost ended. However, Chinese



government should not just let the accident go away and the leaders have to learn some lessons from this disastrous accident.

Firstly, the firefighters must be professionals and only professionals know to use the right way to put out the fire according to the material on fire. In China, the firefighters are not professionals and they are just the same as the soldiers in the army. The firefighters serve in the fire department for 3 or 4 years and just have simple training of fire extinguishment. As a lack of knowing what caused the fire, after the first explosion, when the firefighters arrived at the site, they just blindly put out the fire with water. It was definitely wrong to put out the fire of the chemical with water! If they had not put out the fire with water, they would not have lost their lives! After the accident, I read some news knowing that the firefighters in the USA, Japan and some other countries are all professionals and they can work for all their life. Hence, they are all familiar with the buildings in their service area. I hope Chinese government will learn this from this accident and will recruit the professional firefighters.

Secondly, the warehouses have to be situated a safe distance from the residential areas. In the warehouse, there may be hundreds of tons of goods and if it is on fire, a risk of explosion is very high. A big explosion can cause a very bad damage to the building and people nearby. In the Tianjing accident, as the warehouse was close to the residential area, most of the people injured were residents who lived close to the warehouse and also residential buildings next to the warehouse were badly damaged. After this accident, all the companies and government leaders have to bear in mind that when choosing a place for a warehouse, it is very important that the warehouse is a safe distance from the residential area. All the existing warehouses without the safe distance from the residential areas need to be moved.

Last but not least, the accident is ascribed to human factors due to corruption and individual benefit between

powerful officers. In the news conferences, many journalists always asked the questions: why the warehouse was situated there, why the warehouse company could not give an inventory of all goods, why the goods in the warehouse were far more than its capacity and who are the owners of the company. No one from the government answered directly these questions. As I know, China has the strictest laws and regulations in the world and according the law and regulation, the warehouse should not have been built in the current place and the company should not have had the permission to store chemical goods. I am sure the government leaders had known about the violation of the law and regulation. But, due to corruption and benefits between them, they just blindly closed their eyes and let those things happen against the law and regulation. As the Chinese Security Minister said, I hope Chinese government will determine and harshly punish those who are responsible for this incident. And also I hope Chinese government officers learn that complying with the law and regulation is very important and they will not take any risk for their own individual benefit.

Finally, I hope Chinese government can learn those lessons from this incident and no similar incident happens again in the future.

Sticky Rice Cake

- 3. Roughly chop pecan nuts into small pieces, and sprinkle on the top of the mixture;
- 4. Bake at 350º for 30-40 minutes or until golden. Cool on a wire rack. Yield: 12-16 servings.

Ingredients

- 1.5 pounds tilapia fillets or Pacific cod fillet, cut into pieces
- 1 pound peeled shrimps (optional)
- 2 teaspoons minced garlic
- 2 onions, chopped
- 3 large bell peppers, sliced
- 3 large tomatoes, sliced
- 1 bunch cilantro or parsley, finely chopped
- 3 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 4 tablespoons olive oil
- 34 cups unsweetened coconut milk



Method

- 1. Stir the tomatoes, lime juice, garlic, salt and 2 tablespoons olive oil in a large bowl. Add the fish with marinade, then cover and refrigerate the mixture at least 20 minutes.
- 2. Heat the remaining 2 tablespoons olive oil in a large pot over medium-high heat. Fry the chopped onions and peppers for 2 minutes. Transfer the mixture in the large bowl to the pot and bring it to a boil. Stir it occasionally. Pour in coconut milk. Reduce heat to medium and simmer 25 minutes until fish is soft. Sprinkle the cilantro.
- 3. Serve with steamed white rice.

How to Cook Chinese Style Fried Bean

Zhao Yang W. | Level 5 | Junko T.'s student

The most outstanding character of Chinese style fried bean is that it combines naturally the crispy taste and the oil fragrant smell together; hence, many people like to eat it. Fried bean can be stored in a dry place for months. This universal recipe is fit to cook many kinds of fried bean. For the flavour, it is good for either salty or original. For the ingredients, it can also fit a long list of different kinds of dry beans or similar nuts, such as soy-bean, pea-bean, broad-bean and peanut. After reading this recipe or even just peeking at it, you will be surprised that it is so easy to cook cheap but delicious fried bean, which is as simple as



making clear the differences of the pronunciations between sheep and ship. Now, let's begin:

- 1. Immerse a suitable amount of dry beans into a great deal of water with a fit container, for example, a bin. Let it stand alone for three hours or till the beans are soaked thoroughly.
- 2. Drain soaked beans and get rid of surplus water with a strainer or a colander.
- 3. Pour some vegetable oil (according to your custom, usually oil for ⅓ volume of the soaked beans is enough) into a wok or frying pan; heat oil to more than 100°C (some kinds of oil such as canola oil or corn oil need not be pre-heated);
- 4. Put drained beans into the wok (or frying pan); fry beans with high heat at the beginning, then middle to low, stir beans frequently, till no water vapour arises and 2-3 "pea-pa" sounds per second; turn off stove. (You can use electric deep fryer to cook fried beans too. In such a case, please follow the instruction of the fryer. Usually, it needs to be fried about 10 minutes with a deep fryer.)
- 5. Drain fried bean. Used oil can be stored for next time. Add some seasoning you favour onto fried bean, such as salt and hot pepper powder, and blend it well.
- 6. Patiently wait minutes before enjoying it till hot beans turn cool and become crispier.
- 7. Whether it is successful or not this time, try again and again till you do not need the recipe any more or you can do better according to your own experiences. Remember, for Chinese foods, cooking is not a technology but an art.

Libyan Couscous with Busla

Amel E. | Level 7 | Tuula L.'s student

Ingredients

2 1/2 cups couscous

Approx. 500 mg meat (preferably lamb) about 4 pieces with bone

1 onion chopped

2 1/2 large tablespoons tomato paste

1/2 tsp red pepper

1/2 tsp turmeric

1 tsp salt

1tsp Libyan spice ("harrarat" check a store that stocks Middle Eastern spices)

Pinch of cinnamon

2 tsp any cooking oil

1 cup of chickpeas (soaked in water overnight and drained before use)

Approximately one liter of hot water

Approximately 10 medium yellow cooking onions sliced for the busla.



Preparing the meat sauce

First, peel and slice about two medium onions. Heat some oil in a pot, and add the chopped onion. Sauté until golden then add 2 1/2 tbs. of tomato paste. Cook and stir until the oil becomes reddish in color, turn down the heat. Add the meat pieces and cook and stir. Add 1/2 tsp of red pepper, 1 tsp of salt, 1 tsp of turmeric and 1 liter of boiling water, cover and cook on medium high for about one hour.

Preparing Busla

Put 10 sliced onions in a steamer. After about 10 minutes add about 1 cup of chickpeas, let cook until onions become soft and then sprinkle in some cinnamon and put this mix into another pot. Add to this busia three large serving spoonfuls of the meat sauce and let this mixture cook until it becomes thick on low heat.

Finally, in a large bowl, mix 2 1/2 cups couscous with ½ cup of water and mix well. Put the couscous in a steamer for 30 minutes, then add some sauce and break up any lumps. Sprinkle some harrarat over the couscous.

Serving

In a large clay bowl, put the couscous at the bottom and cover it with busla then add the meat pieces and cover the meat with more busla and sprinkle some harrarat over the dish. Serves 4 people and goes well with a fresh salad.

Pancit Canton Noodles

Pancit Canton is a traditional food in the Philippines. It is served on every occasion. Pancit changes in cooking from the north to the south of the country. People use different kinds of noodles and different kinds of meat. This recipe is one of the most popular variations of this favourite dish.

Ingredients

1 pack (250 grams) pancit canton noodles or any rice noodles 200 grams of pork tenderloin, sliced into small cubes

1 spicy farm cooked sausage, sliced

1 small onion, peeled, sliced

1 teaspoon minced fresh garlic

8 to 10 pieces of medium raw shrimp, peeled

10 to 12 pieces of snow peas

1 medium carrot, sliced

1 small head of cabbage, chopped fine

2 cups of chicken broth

1 tbs of oyster sauce

3 tbs of soy sauce

1 small bunch of parsley chopped

3 tbs of canola oil

Instructions

- 1. Place 3 to 4 cups of water in a large pot and bring to boil.
- 2. At medium heat, blanch the vegetables for 1 minute in the hot water.
- 3. Remove the vegetables from the pot.
- 4. Put the vegetables in a bowl immersed in ice cold water.
- 5. Pour canola oil in a large pot.
- 6. Fry onions and garlic lightly.
- 7. Add the shrimp, then cook for 5 minutes at medium heat. Remove the shrimp from the pot.
- 8. Add the pork to the pot and fry for 10 minutes.
- 9. Add oyster sauce, soy sauce and salt and pepper to taste.
- 10. Add chicken broth and water. Bring to boil for 5 minutes.
- 11. Add the pancit canton noodles in the pot and let cook for max. 5 min to allow them to absorb the sauce, then mix well.
- 12. Add shrimp, parsley, vegetables and mix well.
- 13. Put pancit canton in a serving dish and serve hot.



Delicious Honduran Rice Pudding with Raisins Recipe

- 1 lb. of jasmine rice
- 2 cans of evaporated milk
- 1 can of condensed milk

White Kimchi

White Kimchi is a delicious, non-spicy pickled Napa cabbage stuffed with a variety of colorful vegetables. I first made Kimchi in Canada.

Ingredients

Napa Cabbage (1 whole Napa cabbage, about 4 pounds)

Radish (1 pound)

Carrot (1pound) Water (10 cups)

Apple (1 pound)

Pear (1 pound)

Sweet potato (1 pound)

Grated garlic (1 teaspoon)

Grated garlic (1 teaspoon)

Green onion (1/2 pound)

Sesame seeds (1 teaspoon)

Sea salt (2 cups) Sweet rice powder (1 tablespoon)



Preparation

1. Cut Napa cabbages

Cut the Napa cabbages in half, then cut a slit through the stem. Mix 10 cups of water and 2 cups of coarse salt in a large enough bowl to fit all the cabbage halves. Fully immerse the halves in the salt water and leave them for at least 6 hours .

2. Wash & drain

Wash them thoroughly 3-4 times. Drain all the water out by placing them over a strainer upside down. Leave them for an hour.

3. Make broth

Mix 1 tablespoon glutinous rice powder with 1/2 cup water, simmer over low heat until it thickens and after that, let it cool.

4. Make seasoning mix

Cut apples, onions, and pears into slices. Grind them with a blender. Mix them together and season with salt and fish sauce.

5. Cut vegetables

Finely cut the radish, carrot, sweet potato, pear and green onion into sticks.

6. Mix vegetables with sauce

Combine the vegetables with the seasoning ingredients of salt, garlic, ginger, sesame seeds and fish sauce. Pour some of the broth from step 3 and add some of the seasoning mix from step 4 and combine.

7. Apply seasoning and wrap the cabbage

Apply the seasoning mix in between the leaves of Napa cabbages. Make sure there is enough vegetable bits in each layer. Wrap the cabbage with outer leaves. Pour the remaining broth and seasoning mix over the cabbages in the container.



We don't have friends who speak only English, but we speak with people when we go shopping and when we are looking around, especially when I'm with my baby. Finally, things are working out and I can say that our integration is on its way.

Overcoming Barriers

Not only have prices dramatically increased, but also buyers don't have enough time to inspect the property thoroughly because they have to make a decision within a few hours, even minutes.

To conclude, it's never easy to find a suitable place to live, but luckily the whole process is under the regulations of the government through the Landlord and Tenant Board.

My Advice to New Immigrants

I would like to give some advice to those immigrating to Canada soon. These pieces of advice are from my own experience. I have been living in Canada for over 4 years now, so I know that the language is a big barrier for immigrants to get a good job and get along without any support. Many immigrants have difficulty understanding other people, participating in everyday communication and completing documents, for example. Another obstacle is getting a professional license or a certificate. After arriving in Canada you should connect with a professional association and find out how to start. Be prepared that

many diplomas and other educational certificates are not recognized in Canada right away. If you need to get a license to work, you have to go for assessment again when you are already here. There are some helpful things that new immigrants should know about, such as volunteering. We know no one wants to work for free, but there are benefits and you may consider this for a short while. Volunteering in the area you want to work will help you prove that you know what is expected at work and will give you some contacts. Join community group, professional associations, sports team or any other group that will connect you with people you would not normally meet. You will need to work extra hard to make those connections. For me the transportation is also very important, so try to get the driver's license as soon as you can. But, in my opinion, most important is to improve the language skills as you make plans for your life in a new country.

Tips from My Initial Six Months in Canada

As a newcomer, it is always strenuous to settle down in a new country in the beginning stage of immigration. Based on my first half year's experience, I am pleased to share my feelings and inspiration about how to settle down from several aspects, hopefully giving some tips or suggestions to new immigrants.

First and foremost, you need to have a Canadian home. As the saying goes, east or west, home is best. Being a new immigrant, it is imperative to rent or buy a house or an apartment which can be regarded as your home. Many factors including but not limited to location, price, transportation and logistic service should be considered. Due to a lack of familiarity and stability, my family rented a house instead of buying, and the process turned out smoothly with helpful information from friends, accommodation websites and housing forums. Once you have a residence, you can follow up with other settlement issues like acquiring a driver's license, health card, school for kids. Also, I find

that actually living in a place helps you get familiar with how the daily routine of life is in your new community.

Another issue of paramount importance is to expand your network of people. In my experience, it is more significant to have a willingness to communicate than the actual ability to have a high level of language usage. It is crucial to realize that you are new here, so being open-minded to interacting with local people is always preferable and immersing yourself into a community or a circle of friends will help you get more information and assistance. There are dozens of ways to encounter new people and gradually make new friends via attending ESL classes or parent meetings, participating in some routine activities like going to church or playing sports, along with others. With your enlarged network, settlement and adjustment will become easier and quicker.

Another key consideration is to accept and overcome system differences between your native country and Canada. Loving my health care professional job, I decided to search for a similar job in Canada. However, the medical licensure process turns out to be very complicated in Canada for international medical graduates and professionals. I have encountered educational and professional system differences, facing a series of barriers such as foreign qualification recognition and credential assessment. Although I had already done some preparation for that, it seems inevitable that I must spend a great deal of time and energy to achieve this goal. I recommend you pay attention to this professional issue as soon as possible if you are in the same boat. It is another example of how challenging it is to be new immigrants in a different country.

I have mentioned what I have learned in the initial six months in Canada with my goal of sharing the pros and cons through my experiences. Although it is a challenge to start a new life as an immigrant, I firmly believe that nothing is too difficult if you set your mind on it. You could lead a brighter life in Canada with an optimistic attitude and a strong eagerness to learn.

My Life in Canada


